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

NOTICE REGARDING D.T.M.C. WEEK! NO TRIPS

There has been some confusion recently about the use of the Trip List system on the Club Notice Board, and the following points should be noted when signing up for a trip:

- 1. Notice of future trips is usually posted 3 4 weeks in advance.
- Trip Lists close on THURŞDAY Club nights, 8 days before trip departure to allow trip organiser and party leaders time to make their arrangements.
- 3. Before signing Trip List, intending participants should talk to trip organiser about possible destinations and grade of trip.
- Signing the Trip List commits you to pay the trip fare, if you withdraw after the closing date.
- The first 13 places on the List are usually for a rental van, and later names on the List may be asked to make up car-travel groups, if there are not enough for another van.
- Trip fare is indicated on the List, and should be paid to the Treasurer BEFORE departure. All non-members of O.T.M.C. must pay the fare. plus surcharge, before departure.

The Committee asks all O.T.M.C. members and non-members to co-operate with these points, to ensure the smooth and fair running of the Trip Programme.

Gear Hire Convenor

The Club carries a range of items - tents, flies, packs, ice-axes, crampons, and a few slashers. At the moment, replacement flies for the blue flies are being looked at; this is a long-term project as, at the moment, running repairs keep the flies available for use.

GEAR HIRE RULES:

- 1. Hirers are liable for loss and damage to gear.
- 2. Gear hire hours are 7.30 p.m. to 8.00 p.m.
- Gear hire officer may demand a deposit on gear, if considered necessary.
- Gear hire officer may charge call-out fee for people wanting gear on other than THURSDAY nights.
- Impose an extra charge on those who do not return gear on other than IHURSDAY nights.
- 6. Gear MUST be returned in good condition, and defects reported.
- 7. Truts and flies must be refolded NEATLY, with item No's visible.
- 8. Hirers pay for gear in ADVANCE.

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The Powerful Leaf



On 9 February, five Club members spent the day on noxious weed control at Ben Rudds. This work was in response to a letter received last year by the Club, from the noxious weeds inspector from the Silverpeaks County. The inspector was concerned about the spread of gorse and broom out on Flagstaff Scenic Reserve.

Well, after a few good hours work of cutting broom and cutting gorse, and painting the stumps with Tordon, we'd made some headway on the weeds above the track from the Bullring.

However, there are still many hours work to do, and if the Club does not keep up the work, we may find someone else doing it for us.

BIG BILLS. Some of the work could possibly be contracted out, but this would only be appropriate on areas of dense infestation. Straggling spreaders should, and can be controlled by Club members.

The work on 9 February brought home a couple of points to me:

- 1. It's hard work and there are a lot more plants up there than is at first perceived.
- It's expensive. Our little effort cost:

Some of this is now Club property, like most of the two litres of Tordon and nine new pairs of shears. The lesson is that to be a landowner requires commitment, even just to maintain the status quo, let alone make forward movements on it. 
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BOOK REVIEW

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OUTDOOR RECREATION GROUP REPORT

PROPOSED SILVERPEAKS SCENIC RESERVE

A recent Clubnight on 28 February was spent discussing the proposed Silverpeaks Reserve. Ken Mason presented an interesting photographic view of the proposal, and Richard Pettinger gave a description of the geography of the area. This gave a good insight into the changes over the years. For example, Richard pointed out that the Silverstream catchment was almost entirely tussock one hundred years ago, and has regenerated to it's present bush-clad state in that time. The implication is that this sort of change could occur to other areas if they were left alone, i.e., without grazing, burning, etc. Imagine that! Bruce Mason led the discussion through a wide range of issues. The general feeling was that reservation will be the best approach for our recreational purposes.

The possible boundaries were discussed, and it was felt that a fairly large reserve would better preserve the area. The possible inclusion of water catchment areas was looked at, and perhaps the only clear conclusion would be that the issue needs to be looked at in greater detail. Lastly, ways in which the Club can contribute were discussed briefly, and these included guided walks, and historical and natural history guides. There is a lot we can do, and should do, and we will keep you informed of developments.

MINISTRY OF ENVIRONMENT

Submissions were made strongly, favouring establishment of a Ministry of Environment having legislative authority in matters of planning, controlling, and management of natural resources. This is seen as one of the more important issues of our time, being central to most New Zealand conservation issues.

The following management plans will be discussed at our next meeting, so if you are interested, please come along:

- Fiordland National Park
- Westland National Park
- Hooker/Landsborough

MT ASPIRING NATIONAL PARK

At our next meeting, we will also be looking at Mt Aspiring National Park management planning issues, and hopefully Roger Barrowclough, the F.M.C. nominee on the Board, will be able to attend.

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NEWS FROM OVERSEAS

Fellwoodhead Little Urswick Ulverston CUMBRIA LA12 OHT

Dear All

At last a long overdue subscription and letter. The cheque for \$30.00 should cover both the sub. and airmail postage of the bulletin. It would be good to have up-to-date news, and be able to enter things like the slide competition. Could you also let us have an O.T.M.C. song book - Ainslie is pining for a few N.Z. ditties! If the cheque does not cover this, let me know.

Since coming back here, I've been doing a lot more orienteering than for many years, though not with all that much success. There's lots of good terrain within easy reach, so the local club puts on a lot of very small events. We've also been doing a lot of canoeing - we've both got Nordkapp sea canoes, and use them around here, both on the lakes and sea. Problem with that is that it's very tidal, with hundreds of sq km's of mud exposed at low tide.

We've really done very little tramping, except for short trips with Kiwi visitors. Janet and Michelle stayed for a while last summer, before getting jobs in Scotland. This was followed by a phone call from Tony Bunting, who purely by chance, was staying with relatives of Helen in Ulverston. Since then, Helen has stayed with us quite a bit, though has now got a job in Oxford. Kiwi visitors are much appreciated, especially by Ainslie, who does feel a bit homesick from time to time.

Our main trip last summer was in the canoes. on the west coast of Scotland. We set off from the Kyle of Lochalsh by the ferry over to Skye, and over the next few days, went up the west side of Raasay round Rona and back via the Crolin Islands to Kyle. The south through Kyle Rhea to Sandaig was made famous by Gavin Maxwell in RING OF BRIGHT WATER. The main tidal flow up the west coast is channelled through Kyle Rhea, giving a current of 6 - 8 knots!!! The landlord (of the pub) is fascinated by this continual stream of Antipodians - (especially since they are mostly female! - Joe's gone to answer the phone! I notice he doesn't tell of our paddle on Boxing Day on Lake Coniston, and the fact that he had to do a roll - intentionally!! Had better give over - boss man back!!!)



TRIP REPORTS

ROARING LION AND KILLER SALAMI

Null Nelson - Tasman Wilderness - Larm Line



Christmas Trip - 26 December '84 - 4 January '85

Dec 26 Arrived at Cobb Reservoir

- 27 To Balloon Hut first encounter with "Killer Salami"
- 28 To Salisbury Lodge & up Mt Arthur
- 29 Around Dry Rock & Gridinon Shelters
- 30 Down Leslie to Karamea Bend

Dec 31 Three bends up Roaring Lion

Jan 1 To bend beyond Cub stream

- 2 1 hr up ridge opposite Discovery Creek
- 3 Over to Fenella Hut via Round & L. Cobb
- 4 Out Cobb Valley & heading home

Nine days of fine weather and tramping, was the Christmas trip. People arrived at the Cobb Valley Reservoir Camping area after a long drive from Dunedin, which was to take it's toll. That evening, Trilobites were searched for, in vain, at the Trilobite Rocks.

The next day we set off to climb out of the reservoir onto the Mt Arthur tablelands (Recreational hunting area), via Mt and Lake Peel, to arrive at Balloon Hut early afternoon after a slow, hot travel with heavy packs. We had plans of reaching Salisbury Hut, but 'matter over mind' meant staying the night, due to an exhausted Kathy finding that Scroggin can come up as fast as it goes down! At dinner we had our first encounter with the Killer Salami. It was lucking in the risotto, cunningly disguised as ordinary, vaguely tasty Salami, but two minutes after eating, there was fire in our mouths and cold in our hearts, at the thought of more to come!

The huts in the area are free (N.Z.F.S.) and are equipped with gas. We then tramped over to Salisbury Hut, where we dropped our packs and Kathy, and went on a day walk to Mt Arthur (5890ft), which dominates the tablelands and is home of the Nettlebed Caves, the area being predominantly limestone, and so packed with potholes which drain all water, that this must be carried. $\dot{}$

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Next day, taking Kathy with us, we spent a day in the Flora Saddle area. The tracks are old gold mining trails, which are now major routes to the tablelands from Nelson for trampers and cavers. Time via Flora Saddle, Mt Arthur - 3 hours; Tablelands direct. Salisbury Lodge - 3-5 hours.

Heading off the tablelands, we descended to the Leslie and its confluence with the Karamea at 'K' bend, and camped below the bend. Sandflies at this point of the trip made their intentions plain, making life interesting till sundown. Several rocks partially block the Karamea causing damming, providing excellent swimming holes.

New Year's Eve was spent travelling down the Karamea on the True Right, to confluence with the Roaring Lion: this provided us with good views of the limestone bluffs along the river and the Garabaldi ridge, a prominent and impressive feature. Three bends up the Roaring Lion we celebrated New Year's Eve with Orambuie and fireworks! Trout, slippery rocks, wasps, N.Z. Railway tarpaulins, deer and goats, route-finding errors - always after lunch - and Killer Salami were features of the Roaring Lion.

Roaring Lion is now an in route, and the only area we tramped in that is in the Wilderness area, though on its border. Well tracked along its banks by use and orange blazes left by the local possum trapper, whose N.Z. Railways tarpaulin-roofed abode we found.

Wasp nests should be avoided, especially by those following the trailblazer, who step on the nest and excite them for the next person along - sorry Jane!! I wondered what all the noise was about when you ran past - until I was stung! A night above Cub stream, then one hour up the exit ridge opposite Discovery Creek, led us out to the tops above Twin Lakes and on to Round Lake, Lake Cobb and Fenella Hut in the Cobb Valley, for our last night in the area.

The views from the tops to the head of the Roaring Lion, and the centre of the Wilderness were exciting - a lot of good trips in there, and maybe Kakapo. Fenella Hut is interesting, architecturally, but is not very functional with a lot of people in it. Out the Cobb Valley in a Nor'wester the next day to the cars, and to make our way home after a most enjoyable trip, and we were glad to escape the last of the KILLER SALAM!!

ALISON'S LOOKING CORNER

A tasty morsel to complete our March Bulletin issue

PORK WITH SPICY ORANGE SAUCE

675 g Pork - cubed and packed at home in plastic bag Margarine

- 1 small Onion
- 1 Green Pepper
- 2 Oranges
- 1 tbsp Worcester Sauce take in small container Beef Stock cube



Melt margarine and fry chopped onion and pepper for five minutes. Add pork cubes and fry for a further 5 - 8 minutes, or until evenly browned. Stir in juice of two oranges, worcester sauce, 150 mls of water and beef stock cube. Bring to the boil and simmer for 30 minutes.

If wishing to cook a one-pot meal, add potatoes and other vegetables as desired, or cook separately if able.

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
