

#### PRESIDENTS REPORT

Best wishes for the new year, I hope It lives up to all expectations.

The club appears to be ticking along nicely.

It's pleasing to see so many members active with Bushcraft. Antony deserves a pat on the back for all the organisation and motivation of us all to help. WELL DONE.

It's great to see the cans rolling in, we're making about \$15 per month out of them. We're keeping a track of the money raised so it can be used for projects that benefit the club, so if anyone has any suggestions tell a committee member. Projects under consideration at present are, "photo history of the club" and/or something for gear hire. Probably the major obstacle facing the committee this term is the subject of "life membership" some decisions need to be made and perhaps some more stangent guidelines laid down. If anyone has an opinion they would like to express write to committee or the bulletin.

On this issue we want to represent the opinions of the majority of members.

The condition of the clubs property "Ben Rudds" is a hot issue at the moment, which Richard Pettinger is trying to take in hand. He has a clean up and revegetation timetable organised and needs heaps of help to implement it, so when Richard asks for help please say yes. Richard has put alot of time into the project so far and with our help we can make some major headway before winter. If you've never been to our property before, a couple of workparties coming up would be the perfect opportunity to see the property.

Committee meetings are always the 1st Monday of the month, and are held in the clubrooms from 7:30pm, all are welcome to attend, we try to keep them, "short and sweet" and we always have biscuits, so if your interested please come along.

With the varied trip list, interesting social programme and lots of new faces around the club we can look forward to an active year.

#### BENN RUDDS UPDATE

The 10 Feb workparty to remove Himalayan honeysuckle seedlings plus other young nasties went well despite the extreme heat. Many thanks go to Peter Mason, Dave & Sue Levick, Stu Mathieson, Jonette Service, Sharon St Clair-Newman, Margaret, Don Cocks, David Peacock, Eric Lord, Tim Moore, Shirley, Malcolm and Dougal McQueen & Darcy. We hand-pulled gorse, broom, ragwort, small pines and rowan trees, blackberry and foxglove as well as the honey-suckle in the hope that the natives amongst it all will benefit from the temporary reduction in competition. Rotting timber and slash is actually providing a useful nursery for many small plants. As well as continuing to remove unwanted competitors, it was thought that any spraying or soil disturbance should be avoided if at all possible, to help encourage the natives to prevail over the nasties. We came to the conclusion that timber and slash on the site of the big plantation should not be touched - there's not much accessible firewood there and it's starting to rot. It's more use to us undisturbed.

Large exotic trees include sycamore, rowan, silver birch, macrocarpa(?) as well as the larches, pines and firs. These should be killed standing with Metalex or similar copper preparation introduced into the heartwood via drilled holes. Some trees were felled by Stu and Malcolm on the workparty and Dave Levick took a team to cut tracks for ready access to stands of trees that need to be felled. A few isolated trees that are conspicuous in the landscape could be felled but most are probably more beneficial left standing (as long as they will not shed a single seed ever again!).

Timber that could be taken for firewood is found mainly in two spots: the thick heap at the down slope edge of the big turn around area; and the newly felled Pinus nigra and Radiata below the fire-break reaching to Pineapple and Swampy. The former heap is quite old and dry but hard to get at. There is clay and dirt mixed in with it. The latter source of firewood is still heavy and green and it is scattered over a wide area with lots of natives in amongst it. If it is to be removed, it must be done without damage to the soil or native vegetation.

Firewood contractors are NOT INTERESTED. One man told me that the firewood supply business is oversupplied with pine wood at the moment. They have more than they need for the next year. If anyone knows of a contractor who is prepared to abide by our stringent environmental protection requirements to get pine wood, let me know. I have been approached by individuals who would like to take small amounts for their own use (for a donation to the Club). Such activities will need to be monitored. I alone have the Club's key to the gate.

The Committee will need to decide on how much wood should be removed. I'm tempted to suggest that most of it be left. It will have rotted away completely in a couple of decades. What do members think?

In the meantime, apart from monitoring small scale removal of firewood, the Club needs to keep at the small natives and think about revegetation work in May. Peter Mason is going to hand spray a thick patch of small gorse seedlings where there are no native species present. Standing trees will be drilled and poisoned at the most effective time. And I will continue to extend an invitation to all to pull out any naties they pass during their wanderings on the property. (Don't mistake Himalayan Honeysuckle for fuschia though... There are some thick mats of the latter.)

The mother of battles is on and there's no doubt we will win.

Congratulations and best wishes to: Ken Mason,Bruce Mason,Richard

Pettinger."

As one of the three honoured I feel that the record should be set straight regard: Don Greer's following statement in the February 1991 bulletin: "...in my opinion no particular member has, during that time. (some 14 years) performed such exceptional service as to merit nominations for Life Membership."

Ian Sime's letter states:"Very few of us can have any real idea of what they have done. Knowing it could be an inspiration to us."

We feel we earnt our Life Memberships. Here, with some explanations of prevailing conditions is KDM's record:

- \*Joined the DTC March 1964 -9months later was on the Club's 12 day Olivines Xmas trip.
- \*The Club's Milford Track Freedom March, Easter 1965.(party member) .

\*Committee member 1967-68

\*Chief Guide 1968-69,1971,72,73. A very active period for the Club. 1971 saw 264 man ascents of 85 different peaks.

\*Vice-President 1973-74.

\*1974-76 N.Z.Walkways Initial Steering Committee. F.M.C.rep.

\*1976-1985 Otago District Walkway Committee. FMC knowledge guided this committee. I was the only member to do regular field checks or inspections over much of the 12 year period.

\*Held Hon. Ranger positions for Mt Aspiring National Park and N.Z. Walkways.

- \*Mountain Safety Council Instructor 1970 ->. Served on the formative Otago Mountain Safety Committee-- instructed at Instructor Training courses and on S.A.R courses.
- \*Organised and formed 8km of new tracks in the Catlins.
- \*OTC 50th Anniversary 1973 -gave the historical slide talk. -prepared the historical photo pages for the 50th Anniversary Outdoors.
- \*OTMC 60th Anniversary 1983 gave a historical presentation.
- \*First instructed for the Club in 1967 involved in every Bushcraft Course since them.
- run or taken a major role in the following courses/instruction: Advanced tramping, basic climbing, advanced climbing, rock climbing, ⊀Have caving, snow caving, downhill skiing, ski mountainsering, x/c skiing, SAR. These have all been done for or through the Club. \*Lead numerous trips including organising a 12 -24 day flub trip to the
- Olivine Ice Plateau, Northern Olivines/Arawata. (3 air drops for 24 club members in 6 parties.)
- \*Numerous talks on a diverse range of topics of interest to the Club.

Have been involved in many recreational and environmental activities that have been in the Club's areas of interest. Of these several in the local area have given great satisfaction being largely solo efforts.

#### Local Personal Achievement Highlights.

- \* Negotiating with the N.Z.Forest Scrvice to reroute a new road well below Hightop rather than over the summit and keeping pine plantings below the road.
- \* Halting the bulldozing of a fire-break road along Rocky Ridge'.
- \* Preventing two attempts to firebreak/road Green Ridge (there have been subsequent attempts.)
- \* Convincing the National Walkway Commission in Wellington to create the Silverpeaks Walkway (a) to protect the 'spine' linking 23 recognised tramping routes from roading.
  - (b) to involve the Lands and Survey Dept (pre DOC) in the area as a prelude to getting the current Silverpeak Scenic Reserve status.
- \* Initiating the Bethunes Gully Walkway, the Swampy Spur Leith Saddle Walkway and the Tunnel Beach Walkway.

#### Current Involvments.

- Establishment of three walking tracks in the Dunedin area and one in the Catlins.
- Researching and producing a comprehensive historical display for the new clubrooms.
- Continuing to lead Club trips and give talks after 27 years continuous service.

Richard Pettinger has done a tremendous amount of largely behind the scene work especially in protecting our local tramping resource. He is currently reactivating momentum on our Ben Rudd property projects.

Bruce Mason, apart from a notable Club involvement, has been for many years a major influence in the direction of New Zealand's outdoor recreation. He has had a large role in safeguarding both the tramper's and general publics rights of access to all manners of public land and the retention/acquisition of recreational land. Bruce's commitment to our outdoors is unique in New Zealand. In my opinion just his being associated with the OTMC is an honour.

I believe the way the Life Membership issues have arisen reflects the way the committee has mishandled the issue and I and others will be looking for explanations at the next AGM.

## OTAC Hot Gossip



on the birth of their second daughter.






Heard at the Bushcraft Barndance "She (Bernadette, the dance caller) felt
