Mark swept the prizes for silliest hat (it once belonged to mickey mouse)


and the shortest lived shovel handle (10 mins).



OUTDOOR RECREATION GROUP REPORT 1990-1991

The Committee appointed me to be the ORG Convenor to take over from Stu Mathieson

Since this time, my main job has been to organise regular meetings on the third Tuesday of each month, 7:30pm. To get bigger attendances, we decided it would be better to hold meetings at the Clubrooms. This seems to have worked as attendances have improved, with sometimes 8-10 people present.

The last few months have been very busy with both written and verbal submissions. I addressed the DCC about the Draft Annual Plan which was lacking in walking based recreational opportunities.

A large number of Club Members attended the Public Meeting at Macandrew Bay about the DCC Draft Plan for walking routes on Otago Peninsula. The Plan was seriously lacking in walking routes. Public pressure enabled three recreational users to be appointed to the Joint Working Party, one of whom is Elspeth Gold, our President. We can look forward to increased walking access on the Peninsula as a result.

Major submissions have been made on the Mt Aspiring National Park Management Plan. This required a great deal of input from many ORG members; in particular, David Barnes, Richard Pettinger, Bruce Mason and the typing job by Sue Levick. We were very concerned that the MANP is very much development oriented. 1.



Allied to this I wrote at short notice the submission on the Otago Air Access Strategy using Mike Floate's excellent FMC submission as the basis for the Club submission.

In an about face the Central Otago District Council stated that the Waikaia Bush Road would "not normally be closed" in winter. This was only after FMC and the OTMC took them to a High Court Judicial Review. We are currently seeking

a legal declaration to keep the road open. This road has been used by the Club for X-C ski instruction, snow-caving as well as many private ski trips to the Bain Block.

There have been a wide range of submissions written regarding concessions, most of which have been written by people such as Mark Planner, Spen Walker and John Pohl.

I have been pleased to see more Committee Members present at ORG meetings and hope in the 1991-1992 year more will attend as well as more ordinary Club Members. We all have a responsibility to protect and conserve the areas in which we tramp and ski. This Club has a proud record in this field and I hope it will continue.

A large number of people have helped with information and one-off submissions, my thanks to you, because ORG could not function without you.


Richard's party next door, had a similar idea. I went visiting and wash nearly overcome by the rum fumes. They all looked very happy.
