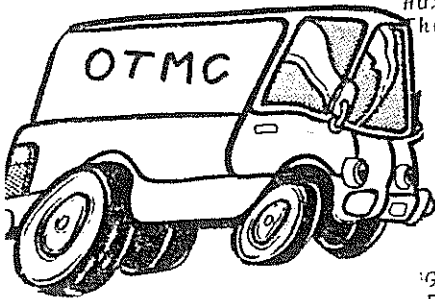
The Editor Speaks

RESOURCE MANAGEMENT LAW REFORM

A review of New Zealand's resource management legislation is underway at present. It's scope is the review of the Town and Country Planning Act, water and soil use legislation, minerals legislation (including mining), and writing environmental assessment procedures into law.

The aims of the reforms are to streamline resource management decisions to minimise delays, allow public participation in decisions, reduce administrative costs, and take into account the impact of decisions on the environment as a whole.

It has been announced that this is a "zero-based" review, which "will allow for successful parts of existing laws to be retained."

This means that it is up to us to tell the Resource Development Law Reform team which parts of the present legislation we consider it important to retain!

A discussion paper "Directions for Change" has been issued. A summary of this is on the club noticeboard for you to read.

Submissions on this discussion paper are due in by Monday 19th September (late submissions up to 26th September).

WHAREPAPA PETITION

You will remember the Wharepapa petition on the reform of the mining laws which was being circulated by the Maruia Society (MFAC) earlier this year. Some of the reforms asked for were:

- that the Crown continue to own mineral resources.
- that mining be treated in the same way as any other resource development (at the moment mining overrides other land uses and the industry has special tax privileges).
- that the rights and opinions of the land owner and community be considered when a mining development is proposed.
- that there be no mining permitted in protected areas such as National Parks and reserves.

Some background information on the petition is on the club noticeboard.

The Wharepapa Petition has been handed in to Parliament with over 154,000 signatures, and has now gone before the Planning and Development Select committee for consideration.

We have until the end of September to make submissions (that is, write letters) supporting the aims of the petition.
