Meet at the club rooms as usual, at 9am on Sunday morning.


November 5 Cycling Trip to Brighton Mary Hewinson 770-200

THE QUEEN'S CHAIN

For over a century, by law there has been a 22 yard wide strip of Crown land along our coastline, rivers and lakes to allow public access and recreation. This is the "Queen's chain".

The Conservation Law Reform Bill, currently being considered by a parliamentary Select Committee, repeals the Queen's chain and replaces it with 'marginal strips'.

These marginal strips, rather than having to be separately surveyed, are going to be shown on the title-deed of the adjacent landowner. It appears that the provisions for creating marginal strips on SOE land also transfer ownership of the strips to the State Owned Enterprises.

The adjacent landowner has the right to be appointed manager of the marginal strip. They can develop the strips, and prevent public access for operational or safety reasons. Yes, you may find in future that access to your favorite beach, river or lake is closed.

At present the adjacent landowners use the strips informally, but have no right to develop them or to close them to the public.

The Bill also allows for marginal strips to be sold off by the Minister, where productive value is considered greater than conservation or public access value. Note that if a landowner owns to the river bank, they also own to the centre of the river!

The effect of this Bill is that the Crown is transferring management of the strips, including control of public access, to private land owners. This is a complete break with New Zealand tradition of free access to the outdoors.

If subs are not paid by the 1st December you will lose your nember-ship, so be sure to pay by the 30th November:



The Radio Otago mast on Swampy Spur- what's happening?

The Department of Conservation sent a letter to DCC on Sept 1st | suggesting that the council considers adopting a policy which confines transmission masts to existing sites and promotes the use of existing facilities wherever possible.

At a meeting of the DCC Planning and Works subcommittee on 12th September, Richard Rayner (Radio Otago director) said that Mt Cargill was "the obvious place" to transmit from, and it was only the "excessive rental" charged for co-siting which made Radio Otago look for another site.

The subcommittee resolved to arrange a meeting of all parties involved to talk about joint use of an existing mast, or failing this a second facility on Mt Cargill.

This meeting was held on Friday 22nd September, and talks are continuing. There will be no public hearing needed unless Broadcast Communications Ltd (who own the Mt Cargill TV tower) and Radio Otago fail to reach an agreement to share facilities.

Radio Otago has asked for the Silverpeaks County planning consent hearing (for a mast on Swampy Spur) to be postponed indefinitely, so any new hearing will be under the new local authority.

The only reason that these businesses are talking together sensibly now is because enough of the public showed that they were concerned at the Swampy Spur mast proposal.

Thanks to all of you who sent in objections, asked the council departments awkward questions, and telephoned their councillors. You did a good job.

"You know son, with a decent motorway spur and utilities this could be a major natural resource".



Mt Luxmore Cooking Competition 9-10 September.


Saturday morning was dull and foggy, however this did'nt dampen our enthusiasm. We were on our way by 9am.

CLIMBING MT AVALANCHE....


The morning was crisp and frosty. It was so cold, that we nearly decided not to bother about the climb. However we did contiune and it was well worth the effort.
