

"Peaks, Packs and Mountain Tracks"

Our club has been given a signed copy of Scott Gilkison's 1940 book "Peaks, Packs and Mountain Tracks".

The donor, Ian Powell, is a life member of the Hutt Valley Tramping Club. People who have tramped in the Tararuas will know Powell Hut on Mt Holdsworth, which is named after him. Ian still holds the distinction of having done the fastest ever climb of Mt Cook (he and his partner used the footsteps of a guided party which had gone up the day before!)

Since Scott Gilkison was a life member of this club, Ian thought we would be a suitable home for his book.

It is interesting to compare his experiences fifty years ago in our local hills and the Otago Alps with the tramping we do now.

There was no French Ridge Hut, so you would camp out at 6500 feet...

The only survivors of an airdrop into Aspiring in 1933 were a pack of cards and a roll of sanitary paper...

Our tents are now more waterproof, but the weather still has to be respected...

Sixty pound packs were normal...

There has been a revival of skiing on the Rock and Pillar Range, but the cross-country skiers in the club can usually only dream of skiing on Flagstaff now!

The book will be displayed in the "valuable and historical books" cabinet in the new clubrooms, and can be borrowed by arrangement with the librarian (Peter Mason).

IMPRESSIONS OF THE CATLINS

Eighteen of "Elspeth's Mob" heading south on the first Friday in May; finding the same takeaway bar in Balclutha "by guess and by God arriving at Tawanui'about "ninish" on a frosty night.

Camps under the pines; a fire in the barbecue pit; talk in the moonlight; mulled wine (yuk); the warmth of the down bag as the night froze on.

Muesli, rehydrated milk and a hot cup of tea on a cloudy morning and it was "packs up" and off after a quick wash and you-know-what in the lovely flush toilets; the beauty of the Catlins River Track-de-luxe tramping this with gravel on the track and wooden sided staircases; my fourth time on this and it never palls--I LOVE IT!

Lunch at the Wisp and more de-luxe stuff; a real table and another go at the flush toilets, but Woe, Woe, WOE! we had to use our own toilet paper. Shame on you DOC-what do we not pay you for?

Early afternoon and off in search of the Thisbe Stream Track; the fishing season's over so we won't get "hooked"; the "roar" is past so no deershooters; however a couple of locals with a dog and guns remind us not to look like a duck; breeches open as they pass us, thank goodness; (I mean the breeches of the guns, wiseguy!)

A ute parked dead centre on the narrow country road reminds us that for some pastimes it's never a closed season; Those two just couldn't believe that we'd rather tramp than help them demolish six crates of brown battles; it WAS a busy road—we were the second party on it that day.

At last the Thisbe Stream Track and into real tramping—the mud, the tree roots, the wet feet. Alas, after only an hour and a half it was getting dark and frantic searchings for a level spot to pith tectent; eight foot by six bang on the track and we had a place to sleep, with the creek just down the bank.

A leisurely, if somewhat frugal, meal by candlelight (predinner drinks, cream of chicken soup, spaghetti boullinaise with parmesan and chopped peppers on top, spongy pud and cream, Irish coffee—filled a hole, I guess) and time for a chat and clean up the rest of the "Irish"; the expiry of the candle left no alternative but bed at the oterwise unheard of hour of eight-thirty.

The comfort and warmth of four bodies in the tent in the friendly bush; to quote Barry Crump-"as snug as rain on the roof"-and boy did it rain?.

Packing up in the rain next morning; hardly a time to enjoy muesli and cold milk; a quick brew up and off back to the Wisp; "brunch" or was it "elevenses" at the picnic table with the other parties; (anyway-a damn good feed) and it was off back down the Catlins to the cars, arriving about 3.30, before the party who had left earlier to bring the cars up to meet us!! (The secret of THIS little ploy will cost you!)

Another brew up and the rest of the food and time to go home; a detour through Kaka Point brought us to Balclutha in the dark and home at a reasonable hour.

Lets go back there sometime--I, MUST see where that Thisbe Stream track goes to.

(THE BEST I'VE EVER FOUND WAS 39pence/L)

SOME WHOLE CLOVES

SOME CINAMON

SOME BROWN SUGAR.

JUICE OF SOME LEMONS(1/L OF WINE)

AN DRANGE OR TWO CUT INTO IT ALL.

GENTLY HEAT, DON'T BOIL, STIR OCCASSIONALLY AND SAMPLE

A LOT WHILE IT IS COOKING

SERVE IN A MUG AROUND AN OPEN FIRE.

WET SOCKS


COLD SITZ BATHS






annual General Meeting

If it is a failure, the secretary is to blame. Ashes to ashes - dust to dust,



PREVENTION OF GIARDIASIS - FOR TRAMPERS

- 1. Portable water filter - enables filtration of water direct from suitable source without need for boiling or chlorination. This water is free from cysts and bacteria but could theoretically contain viruses - not a problem in NZ. In the tropics it is probably best to boil and filter water or to ensure that all water is boiled for a full 5 minutes (to destroy cysts).
- 2. Boiling of water - to destroy cysts (including Giardia cysts) water must be boiled for a full 5 minutes.
- З. Iodine solutions - 3-4 drops of iodine to each glass of water and leave for 10 minutes before drinking is more effective than chlorination; but less effective than filtration or boiling.
- Vegetables washed in contaminated water are a risk these should be washed in boiled water.

Letters to the Editor

Dear Editor.

In the March bulletin, the Editor reported a complaint from "someone who thinks that pictures and gossip should be left out of the bulletin". Since I have talked to people in the club who have been given the impression that I am this person, I think it is time to set the record straight. There is no such person, and there has been no such complaint.

The misinformation relates to a complaint I made about the handling of two trip reports I wrote in 1989. I typed these out neatly with pictures, cartoons and a map, carefully laid out to fit straight into the bulletin. These articles appeared only after a delay of several months, and severely bowdlerised.

In my Labour W/e Macetown article, the historical background and the map were cut out. In my Nicholl's Creek day-trip report, the paragraph about finding pot plants and an appropriate Bogor cartoon were removed.

I made a formal complaint at the March committee meeting. Reasons given by the editor were:

- (1) "It wasn't proper" to publish a report of finding cannabis.(!). I replied that even if our members couldn't cope with the shock, the plants had already been removed by the police.
- (2) "There wasn't enough space." I pointed out that the space saved by editing the trip reports had only been filled in with comic strips, not other trip reports. (How did this comment get inflated into a full-blown cartoon phobia?).

I asked why, if space is so short, every bulletin this year has included an urgent request for more articles. Is 2½ pages really too long for a 3-day weekend trip report, when there was room for a 2 page article about a weekend trip in the March bulletin?

(3) "The editor has final say." I agreed with this principle, but pointed out that there were better ways of asserting it than by delaying publication and making severe cuts without consultation. I suggested that all trip reports should be published promptly. As far as editing goes, the way to have handled it would have been to have phoned me, and either recommended that the articles were more suitable for Outdoors, or else have asked me if I'd be able to cut the report down by (say) half a page and discussed ways of doing it.

The committee upheld my complaint.

So, to all you folk out there who vigorously defended the appropriate use of drawings and cartoons in he bulletin; well done! ADVERTISING PLUG: full versions of the offencing articles will be in the 1991 Outdoors (the next but one)!
