The Annual Meeting in August has continued the recent surge in activity with over 30 members present, perhaps the largest number for some time. As well as looking back at the past year, the meeting provided an opportunity to present the Committee's vision for the upcoming year. As I wrote in the Annual Report, the club is currently in very good shape and we have the prospect of a busy summer period to build on what we have all achieved in 2011. There are many things planned for the upcoming year, as well as issues to consider. The trip programme is being developed now, and will include a variety of trips, including a February cross-over trip from the West Matukituki to the Dart via Cascade Saddle. Another type of trip we are going to trial is to provide a three-day option on some of the normal weekend trips. Having a third day greatly adds to the options that can be had on a weekend trip. Two weekends thus far with this option will be Green Lake in summer, and Macetown. Another feature we would like to include is a mid-week option – is anyone willing to organise this? The summer trip card will be out with the November Bulletin (keep an eye on the website for updates).

One of the issues the club faces regards our affiliation to the Federated Mountain Clubs. FMC have changed the way membership numbers are counted. Currently, we have paid a membership fee (\$10) for every full member. Now, we can choose to either pay for ALL our members (including postal members) and continue to pay \$10 (at present). The other option is to make a partial declaration excluding postal members, and pay a higher per member fee (potentially \$12 for the next year). The overall cost difference to the OTMC is minimal, so it is likely the committee will elect to declare all OTMC members to the FMC. Going forward, the club needs to evaluate the relevance of the Postal Membership class. This will require a change to the club Constitution – we will seek feedback from members once we have prepared a proposal.

A more serious issue for the club is the imminent change in Health and Safety in Employment (Adventure Activities) Regulations 2011. While the final regulations haven't been released, the draft clauses do provide challenges for us. It appears that financial members of the club will be exempt from the regulations, however the problem will be with non-members. The regulations allow clubs to offer activities to encourage membership, but only up to a maximum of 12 days per year. It would be unusual for a non-member to complete 6 weekend trips a year, but this could happen on day trips, which are run on a casual basis. We will now have to collect and retain stats of how many trips non-members have been on. Another issue will be Bushcraft. Bushcraft has always been run as the club's contribution to outdoor safety. The fact we obtain many members from the course is a positive spin-off, but is not the true reason we run the course. An

option we are looking at seriously is altering the membership rules to allow people to be enrolled as members during the course – another Constitution change required. We haven't discussed the implications for Snowcraft (including snowcaving) yet, but it is likely if we continue to run these they will be for members only. Other trips that may be solely for members could be 'special trips', such as the Milford in winter or multi-day trips like Easter or the Five Passes. In hand with this the club will be reviewing the way our trips will be organised and risks managed. The draft regulations are available from the Dept. of Labour website (just search for the regulations).

Congratulations to David Barnes upon his appointment to the Otago Conservation Board. David has had a life-long interest in tramping and the outdoors, and does a great job for the OTMC on conservation matters – this new role is great news for all users of our hills and mountains.

Finally, I would like to thank members for their support at the recent AGM. Ian Woodford was elected to the vacant committee position, joining Tina Anderson (Treasurer) and Sam Patrick as new members on the committee. No prior nominations were received for President or Chief Guide, and I was humbled by the support shown at the meeting in nominating me again for these roles. This vote of confidence confirms to me that your committee are taking the club in the right direction. We have a lot of work in front of us as we head to our 90th anniversary in 2013 – but let's not forget what we are here for – to enjoy the hills and mountains of our great country.



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Trip Reports

Kepler Track 7/8 May

It was an early start on Saturday, with 12 of us arriving at the Control Gates near Te Anau at the start of the Kepler Track at 6.30am. Head torches were put on as we wandered along the track in the dark. The sun was starting to break through the clouds by the time we reached Brod Bay for a short break. A quick count of numbers found we were missing three people—opps. Sure that the missing three couldn't be that far away, after all, the Kepler Track is hard to lose, even in the dark, the remaining 9 of us started up the hill. It is a pleasant climb through the bush, stopping to catch breath and admire the view when possible through the trees. It didn't seem to take long to reach the bluffs which was a perfect scroggin stop and the 'missing' three caught up. Onwards and upwards to bush line where we stopped to regroup and another scroggin stop. The view when you leave the bush on the Kepler Track is spectacular and is well worth the climb. It was here Al caught up with us and was surprised to discover the plan for the weekend was to complete the whole Kepler Track, he had thought we were stopping at Luxmore Hut for the night, I am still not sure what he thought when we had such an early start.

We wandered along the tops to Luxmore Hut where we refilled water bottles and

enjoyed a moments rest in the sun. Here we left behind two of our team as they planned to stay at Luxmore Hut for the night and return to the Control Gates the next day. We shouldered our packs and set off from Luxmore Hut at 11am. It is a steady climb from here up towards Mt Luxmore. The sun shone down on us and the views were fantastic as the mist swirled around the fiords and we climbed higher. At the turn off to Mt. Luxmore we again stopped for a rest before most of the group dropped



packs and headed up the remaining 10 minutes to the top of Mt. Luxmore where we found a film crew filming and telling their models to try' looking more like those

guys'. Something to do with our dishevelled, sweaty state I think.

Back to our packs and long the ridge to the first shelter where we stopped for lunch. A cold breeze blew over the tops but we hunkered down among the tussock for a lunch spot in the sun. Eventually it was time to more on, with the mist rising and



starting to spill over the ridge. The temperature dropped and we kept close together as we continued along the ridge. It became quite wet as the mist swirled around us and cut all view from sight. A final scroggin stop at the second shelter before we headed down into bush line. It is a steep descent from here and just when you think you must be nearly there, the trees open and you find there is still a long way to go! Eventually Iris Burn Hut comes thankfully into sight and a welcome rest at 4.30pm.

Beds for all were found and time for a cuppa before tea. It was great to meet up with another two of our group and a very pleasant night was spent eating, talking and eventually sleeping. We were unsure how long the walk out would take so we were up and away at 9am. The walk down the Iris Burn Valley is mostly in the bush

and very pleasant. Part of the track has been washed out and a detour which involves quite a climb part way down the valley is a bit testing and one of our team decided to take the quick way down—trouble was he decided to land on top of someone else to break his fall. Luckily no broken bones and we carried on to Rocky Point Shelter where we had a stop. From here it was a fast walk out to Moturua Hut, arriving in time for lunch. By now most of us were starting to feel our feet and were happy to rest for a bit in the sun. Too soon it was time to pick



up packs and head along the last hour or so of track to Rainbow Reach. A unanimous vote decided that this would be the end our trip and no one felt the need to carry on the last three hours or so back to the Control Gates.

Thank you to those on the trip for a brilliant weekend away. The weather was great and the company even better!

CHIEF GUIDE COMMENT

The arrival of Spring means that another summer season of tramping is upon us. Below you will find descriptions of the final two weekend trips from the winter card and planning is now underway for the trips from November until the end of May 2012. We are trying a new option on this card, with the trial of an optional third day being available on some of the standard two day trips. Sometimes two days is just not enough time to avoid the direct in and out trips - the third day gives time to explore further, climb a peak or complete a longer round trip. The first trip with a three day is tentatively planned for mid to late November to Macetown. One idea for the middle day is to climb Advance Peak follow the skyline around to Vanguard Peak (with great views over the Shotover and Skippers valleys. Another likely three day option trip is Green Lake in Feb/March 2012 – once you conquer the muddy track from Lake Monowai you may as well enjoy the area. The tops above Green Lake are easily accessible, and provide many options. I know there are some who are unable to get time of work, but a few members have expressed an interest in this and are able to do so.

Other trips that will be on the programme include the end of year trip to Lake Roxburgh, a Cascade Saddle crossover trip from the West Matukituki to the Rees (the last one was in 2007). With Easter in early April it may be a good time to spend time in the Ohau Valleys. The Open Day will be on February 18/19, and Bushcraft 2012 will possibly start on February 28. Other trip destinations are being worked on, and progress can be seen on the OTMC website. Of course, our trips wouldn't run without leaders, so I encourage anyone interested in leading a trip to talk to either Wayne Hodgkinson (day trips) or myself for the weekend trips. We have plenty of experience and information to help you. Leadership is an important role, but isn't too daunting. We look forward to hearing from you. The new trip card will hopefully be included with the next Bulletin.

8/9 October

Andrews Stream/Casey Saddle (Arthur's Pass) Dave Chambers ph. 454 3857/021 1501057

I work shift work so please leave message with contact number.

Experience: Suitable for trampers with moderate experience.

NZTopo50: Cass BV21 (NZMS260: Dampier L33)

This is a pleasant two-day tramp, crossing easy saddles on well-defined tracks through open mountain beech/tawhairauriki forest. The middle section, in the Poulter River, is a stroll along open, grassy river terraces. The weather is regularly drier in this south-eastern corner of the park than in areas close to or west of the Main Divide. Accordingly, this tramp can often be undertaken when conditions elsewhere in the park are unsuitable. The track ends are within 30 minutes walk of each other on Mt White Road. The track starts at Andrews Shelter on Mt White Road; turn off SH 73, 24 km east of Arthur's Pass Village

Casey Hut 16 Bunk, \$5 or hut ticket or pass payable to DOC

22/24 October (Labour Weekend) Otago Central Rail Trail Gene Dyett ph. 455 7465

Grab your bike and follow the 150km Otago Central Rail Trail. Starting at Clyde and cycling through to Middlemarch over three days. A van will be travelling with us so you will only need to carry a day bag. We will be camping at Omakau and Ranfurly in tents with the option of cabins. Tea can be bought from home or a meal in the local pub with the option of a BBQ tea at Ranfurly. Over three days, the Rail Trail is relatively easy with numerous stops along the way for refreshments. Take the opportunity to travel at a leisurely place through Central Otago, enjoying good company along the way. This has proven to be a popular trip in the past so be sure to sign the list in the clubrooms or talk to Gene.

2 October Unexplored Silver Peaks [F] Richard Pettinger ph. 487 9488
